## Oshkosh Plant To Get Salute

HERE'S a big reason Oshkosh is printing the word "appreciation" in capital letters on the tickets for its appreciation banquet climaxing a "Salute to Midwec" Day next Saturday. Citizens of the Garden County seat claim the booming electronic corporation is "the industry that has transformed a

small town into a bustling community with a future."

The city's plans for the future including Midwec — got statewide recognition in 1970 with a third place in the Nebraska Community Improvement Program. The company, a telephone equipment manufacturer, came

to the Panhandle community in 1957. Today it has two plants employing 160 persons. Its output, combined with a third plant at Scottsbluff, resulted in gross sales of \$5 million last year. Focal point of the Chamber of Commerce-sponsored salute

will be the company's newest Oshkosh plant opened alongside Highway 26 on the east end of town last October.

The modern building will be the site of a 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. open house. The day will wind up with a 6:30 p.m. banquet in the Oshkosh Auditorium at which time investors and originators of the company will be honored. It will be followed by a reception at the Oshkosh Country Club.
